

NBCA's Annual Meeting — Tuesday, March 19

At this meeting you will get an update about all that is going on in the neighborhood, city, county, and state that affects you and your family.

Our keynote speaker this year is Mary Norwood, who just took over as Chair of the Buckhead Council of Neighborhoods (BCN). Mary has a long record of public service including many years on the Atlanta City Council and two very close elections for mayor. She will brief us on the many initiatives being undertaken by BCN.

Meeting presentations will include a variety of topics. In addition to Mary Norwood, we have invited elected officials who represent us in city, county, and state government. We don't have confirmations from all of them yet, but we usually get an impressive turnout.

First-time visitors to our annual meeting are often surprised by the quality and content of the discussions led by our elected leaders. There are few opportunities like our meeting provides for citizens to ask their leaders, standing a few feet away, questions and hear their answers.

We will also have a presentation about Loridans Greenspace, our neighborhood's latest public park project. This one likely has a history that goes back as far in the past as any public park. The family cemetery in the park is old. It dates back to **1852**. Surveying done in January by a group of high-tech archeologists hired by Livable Buckhead detected far more graves within the park than were reported by famed Atlanta historian Franklin Garrett, who found 24 unmarked graves when he visited the site in 1930. The park will have a wrought iron fence around the graveyard. PATH400 will pass through the park. There will be more to do than look at the cemetery. Come and learn more about it. We may also arrange presentations about initiatives at other North Buckhead parks.



This simple marker is one of at least five dozen that give us unexpected insights into our neighborhood's history. In 1930, famed Atlanta historian Franklin Garrett visited a site on Loridans Drive and found one of Atlanta's oldest family cemeteries.

His research showed the cemetery dated from 1852. He saw a few normal engraved markers, but there were two dozen graves marked by stones with no names. Many were children. Perhaps some of those buried here were slaves.

In January, archeologists marked at least 60 graves. A respectful fence around the cemetery is planned. Join us at our Annual Meeting to learn about this historic part of our future Loridans Greenspace park.

Come to the social to meet your neighbors and our leaders. You can meet many of the volunteers who make the North Buckhead Civic Association a success. There will also be an election for nine positions on the NBCA Board.

Restaurant Review: F & B

Looking for a place with great food, a comfortable atmosphere, and neighborhood charm? F & B has all these attributes. F & B is a French bistro in the Ritz-Carlton Residences skyscraper, 3630 Peachtree, on the corner of Peachtree and Peachtree Dunwoody Roads, right here in North Buckhead. They serve a good variety of authentic French dishes and more. Examples are pâté, Roquefort cheese, and prosciutto. A group of us checked it out at lunch on a Friday recently.

The best way to get there is to go south on Peachtree Dunwoody Road, and make a right into a driveway just before the turn onto Peachtree Road. There is a driveway between two buildings. Go up, turn left, and take advantage of the valet parking. (Valet parking saves a walk from the large parking deck.)

The atmosphere is informal: rustic wooden floors, wait staff wearing jeans, but there are tablecloths, cloth napkins, and thoughtful service.

Our group got oysters on the half shell (small oysters from Delaware, all the same kind), pâté, chicken linguine, duck leg confit, and the house specialty suggested by the waiter, beef bourguignon. We ordered sides of asparagus (other options are wild mushrooms, sautéed spinach, Brussels sprouts, more).

As we waited for our order, we thought about what we liked about the restaurant. Location! That is one thing. It is about five minutes from where we live. We like the informal and friendly atmosphere. This place is interesting, with a French country look and cuisine. We could hear each other talk and have an agreeable conversation, with pleasant quiet jazzy music in the background. We enjoyed the welcoming and comfortable ambiance. Our waiter was polite and helpful, which has always been our experience here.

Then our order came. The pâté was served with little pickles, a lovely grainy mustard, and toast crisps. It was delicious. As for the Delaware oysters, I had to have more. The duck confit was well-rendered, so not fatty, lean and tender. The chicken linguine was flavorful, and featured freshly-made pasta: something we would order again.

The rolls appear to be a specialty. Many restaurants don't have bread that is worth speaking of, but these French rolls, toasty and crunchy on the outside and meltingly tender within, were tasty and seem fresh-baked. The asparagus was perfectly cooked, fresh, and tasted of springtime.

As for the beef bourguignon, it was very beefy, tender and seemed slow-cooked. It tasted like red wine and carrots. The gravy was smooth and flavorful. Personally (and I realize this may be a classic French dish), I like more vegetables and more sauce in a stew like this. This had a lot of beef. It was the kind of dish that, if you are a person who perhaps likes to order a steak when you go out to eat, you would have liked because there was so much meat. I had qualms about this and thought about the environment. It tasted really good, though.

All the food was ideally cooked, flavorful, fresh, tender, some of it on the rich side. The restaurant is rustic, comfortable and neighborly, and the food is delicious. I have been to France several times, and the food at this bistro seems authentic. There is a nice view of Peachtree Dunwoody Road, to add to the appeal of this neighborhood gem. I look forward to going back another day, and checking out the tuna carpaccio, and pear tart with pistachio ice cream and caramel sauce. F & B also has soup and sandwiches on their menu (leaner options), and a full bar.

We have visited F & B many times for lunch and dinner and have always been pleased with the food, the service and the relaxing layout.

Scout Matthew Keagle, an Accomplished Park Volunteer

Have you noticed the transformation of Mountain Way Common in North Buckhead over the past several years? The land, located in the valley under and near the GA 400 bridge over Mountain Way, was once largely overgrown and inaccessible. Now, due to the efforts of neighborhood leaders and nearby residents, Mountain Way Common has become a park with walking trails, benches, bird houses, and new tree saplings.

Many of these changes have come at the hands of Matthew Keagle, a Boy Scout from Troop 370 and a Junior at Holy Innocents' Episcopal School. Matthew, who grew up on nearby North Ivy Road, began volunteering at Mountain Way Common as an eight-year-old Cub Scout. When it came time to choose an Eagle Scout project in 2016, Matthew knew exactly what he wanted to do: a project at Mountain Way Common focused on clearing invasive species and overgrowth, installing a trail system, and building birdhouses and benches in a section of the park.

This ambitious Eagle Scout project ended successfully in 2017 with 556 combined volunteer hours. However, Matthew's work in the park was not yet done. His sights were set on earning the Hornaday Award, which recognizes Scouts who make significant contributions to conservation. The projects that he has undertaken for this award include additional invasive species removal, water quality testing and education, and reforestation.

Invasive species are defined as plants or animals that are artificially introduced into a non -native habitat that can cause environmental damage. Matthew has worked to remove privet and English ivy, two invasive species that will spread quickly if unchecked, from much of the park. He and other dedicated volunteers have filled six dumpsters full of these plants, along with trash and other debris, over dozens of workdays.

Matthew completed his certification in Bacterial Testing and Chemical Monitoring with Georgia Adopt-A-Stream. Since May 2018, he has monitored the section of Little Nancy Creek which runs through the park. He posts the bacterial testing results on the Adopt-a-Stream website and will be adding educational material about invasive species and water quality, on the Mountain Way Common website after it is updated. Matthew hopes that his efforts will spread awareness about the state of our streams, and decrease the pollution in our water through simple preventative measures.

Finally, Matthew and Mountain Way Common leaders teamed together to apply for and receive \$12,000 for his reforestation effort.

With a grant from Trees Atlanta, Matthew has already planted 43 native hardwood trees, and with a grant from the National Environmental Education Foundation (NEEF), he is planning to plant another 100 saplings, along with native flowers and woody shrubs, around the park.

Matthew has made an undeniable impact on Mountain Way Common, but he still remembers the way the park looked before the workdays. The park has transformed from an overgrown, unused land filled with trash to a pleasant greenspace with trails. There is still much work to be done, but seeing the change in Mountain Way Common makes Matthew believe that anything is possible.

Sustainability Action Plan Seeks an Even Better Buckhead

There are lots of reasons to love living in Buckhead, where everything from good schools to world-class restaurants and retail are within easy reach. A thriving community has more than just good shopping and schools, however. It has parks, trails, public art, and community events. It supports responsible use of environmental resources, and it encourages health and wellness. And it doesn't have debilitating traffic.

We're not there yet, but Buckhead is making great strides in all of these areas and the pace of progress may soon get a boost, thanks to the <u>Buckhead Strategic Sustainability Action Plan</u>. Livable Buckhead and a committee of more than 30 business and community leaders have outlined ambitious goals to accelerate Buckhead's environmental, economic and social sustainability over the next three years.

What's in store?

More greenspace: 37 acres have been added over the past decade, but that's just the beginning. The plan calls for every Buckhead resident to live within a half mile of a neighborhood park.

More electric vehicle chargers: Nearly two-thirds of Buckhead is within one mile of an EV charger; the plan aims to make that 100%.

- More solar: PATH400 will become energy net positive by adding solar infrastructure to offset all of its electricity use, and Livable Buckhead will continue to encourage adoption of solar power by area businesses.
- **More recycling**: The plan aims to find a Buckhead location for a CHaRM facility, and to encourage more recycling at commercial buildings.

That's just a sampling of the dozens of goals outlined in the sustainability plan. The plan includes strategies for continued improvement in eight areas: water, health and wellness, greenspace, energy, waste, culture of sustainability, mobility, and arts and culture. Under Way: Rain Chamber for Endangered Frog Species

The Amphibian Foundation is constructing an exclusive new home for endangered amphibians from around the world. This new home, called a tropical rain chamber, is located at our headquarters on North Buckhead's Blue Heron Nature Preserve. When completed, the public can view the eight-foot chamber and its new residents during events hosted at the foundation.

To address the rapid decline of amphibian species, we work with partners to lead a Captive Breeding Program. We raise certain amphibians in captivity and their offspring can potentially be released into protected habitat in the wild. The rain chamber is an enclosure designed to simulate the rainy season, which encourages tropical frogs to breed.

This state-of-the-art indoor ecosystem will be fully controllable: rain, mist, water depth, heat, cold, thunder, lightning, sunrise, and sunset will all be programmable for some of the world's most endangered frog species. The new project will help expand our breeding work and contribute vital scientific knowledge to the amphibian community.

We're also building a reptile lab to support our educational programs like Critter Camp, which is a science-based hands-on day camp for children. The reptile lab will hold amazing



species of turtles, lizards, and snakes and teach people of all ages about these fascinating animals.

Both projects were made possible through generous donations of materials, equipment, and supplies from Zilla (<u>zilla-rules.com</u>). Atlanta wholesaler SunPet (<u>sunpet.com</u>) donated beautiful pieces of wood, branches, and rocks to help the frogs feel at home, and Josh's Frogs (<u>joshsfrogs.com</u>) donated beautiful plants to provide cover, microhabitat, and beauty. We sincerely appreciate their contributions and can move forward in our conservation work with these donations.

Frogs, Salamanders, and Newts! Get Involved!

Amphibians like frogs and salamanders help keep humans and the environment healthy. In fact, one thousand amphibians eat five million insects a year, which helps limit the spread of disease. Unfortunately, 43 percent of the world's amphibians are in catastrophic decline or have become extinct. In Georgia, the Frosted Flatwoods Salamanders have suffered a 90 percent population loss since 2000. The Amphibian Foundation works with partners to address this decline, and we want to work with you, too.

In 2016, the Amphibian Foundation was founded on the beautiful Blue Heron Nature Preserve in North Buckhead. Our mission is to connect individuals, communities, and organizations to create and implement lasting solutions to the global amphibian extinction crisis. We take a twopronged approach by partnering with state, regional, federal, and global agencies to lead educational programs for all ages and conservation programs that benefit amphibians, wildlife, and the environment.

The educational programs are aimed at fostering excitement about the wonder of these fascinating animals and inspiring conservation. They also help us support critical conservation initiatives. Through these events, it is you, our community, who help us protect endangered amphibians and their habitat.

This summer, the Amphibian Foundation is offering opportunities for our two most popular programs: **Critter Camp** (ages 4-18) and the **Master Herpetologist Program** (ages 18+). Registration is open for both programs, but space is limited and sells out quickly.

Critter Camp is a week-long day camp that explores the world of amphibians and reptiles. Each day features a type of animal, including salamanders, frogs, turtles, lizards, and snakes. Campers learn about biology and conservation while handling the animals (critter-camp.org). The Master Herpetologist Program is instructed

Maxine Rock, 1940-2019

Maxine Rock passed away peacefully on February 19, 2019. She was a founder and President of the North Buckhead Civic Association and was instrumental in the creation of the PATH Foundation, which has built numerous walking and bicycle trails throughout the Atlanta region. She was a tireless advocate for the environment and maintained membership in the Sierra Club, the Nature Conservancy and other environmental and wildlife agencies. She was an enthusiastic cyclist, potter and painter.

Maxine was born in New York City on April 29, 1940 to parents Jean and Louis Hochman. She graduated from NYU in 1961 and from the University of Michigan in June 1963 with a graduate degree in journalism. She was a journalist and writer who authored numerous articles and books on medicine, environment, human relations and science. Her favorite book was the one she wrote with her grandchildren entitled Adventures in Faun Forest.

She is survived by her husband, David, daughter Lauren Rock and son Michael Rock of Atlanta; by son in law Jarad Schiffer and daughter in law Pamela Rock; and by grandchildren Rachel Rock Schiffer, Ren Rock Schiffer, Sara Rock and Jordyn Rock all of Atlanta, Georgia.



Zone 2 Crime Up

As shown in the map below, Atlanta has six police precincts. Zone 2 Precinct is the largest by land area. It serves the northern part of the city, including Buckhead.



The graph below shows the change in Atlanta's felony crimes from 2012* through 2018.

The rest of Atlanta crimes declined 29%.** Zone 2 Precinct crimes <u>increased</u>14%.***



The decline in crime in the whole city, especially violent crime and robberies, is a major success. But growing crime up here is a valid concern.

* Zone 2's area was expanded with the addition of three patrol beats in 2012. No changes have happened since.

** The other five precincts each experienced crime declines.

*** North Buckhead's 2012 to 2018 crime declined 2%. Data source: "Raw Crime Data Download" at APD's website.

NBCA Bylaws Change

The NBCA Board approved an interim onesentence change to the NBCA Bylaws in mid-February.

Currently, the Bylaws require non-incumbent candidates who seek to join NBCA's Board to give three months notice of their planned candidacy. Among other things, this schedule ensures that the candidate will be listed in the North Buckhead Newsletter as a candidate. Among the issues the Board must consider is the newsletter editing schedule and the date selected for the Annual Meeting or special meeting, when board candidate elections must be held.

The change gives the Board the latitude to relax schedule requirements a candidate must meet to be nominated as an NBCA Board candidate.

<u>Previous:</u> **5.2.b** The Secretary (or other officer) must be apprised of such nominations at least **three months** before the election.

<u>After Change:</u> 5.2.b The Secretary (or other officer) must be apprised of such nominations at least three months before the election. By majority vote, the Board may exempt a nomination from having to meet this three month notification requirement.

There will be a vote by NBCA membership at the Annual Meeting on March 19 to approve or reject this change. (To vote online, see page 13.)


NBCA Board Candidates Bios

Each year, about half of NBCA's Board stands for election to two-year terms. This year we have nine candidates: seven incumbents, one new board member who was appointed by a majority vote of the board last year to a term expiring in March, and one candidate seeking first-time service on the NBCA Board.

Lisa Aman, Beverly Lane — has lived in Atlanta since 1996 and on Beverly Lane since 2014. Lisa received her Bachelor's degree in Economics from Yale University and her MBA from Stanford University. She spent most of her professional career at Bain & Company, a strategy consulting firm. She and her husband, Peter, moved to Atlanta to open Bain & Company's Atlanta office. They have three children, ages 21, 19 and 17.

Currently, Lisa serves on the Fulton County Board of Assessors and owns and operates Graybar Strategies, a political campaign strategy and fundraising firm. She also volunteers on several boards and advises various community efforts: Horizons Atlanta, Finance Chair; Carl E. Sanders YMCA branch board, former Chair, and the Metro YMCA Branch-Association committee; Atlanta's American Jewish Committee; The Hirsch Academy; YWCA's Georgia Women's Policy Institute.
